Dear Parents and Students,

Use of Technology in a Responsible Manner

In today's rapidly evolving world, technology has become an essential part of our lives. It empowers us in areas like education, healthcare, communication, and more. Our students, as digital natives, naturally adapt to this environment. However, while technology opens doors to learning and innovation, it also brings challenges we must address together. Educators with a futuristic outlook should consider it their responsibility to prepare the present generations to face the challenges, that may exist in the times to come. Today's learners possess a natural aptitude for navigating and utilizing the web with ease. As the 'participatory culture' allows them to create, connect, and collaborate with a global audience, the responsibility of educating them about the safe use of technology lies equally with their families and the education fraternity.



Digital citizenship is more important than ever. It includes being aware of online safety, responsible use of devices, respectful communication, and understanding the impact of our digital footprints. As a school, we are committed to helping students become not just tech-savvy, but also ethical and safe users of technology. Cyberbullying, data theft, online scams, and misinformation are real issues. Students must learn to protect their privacy, respect copyright, and use digital tools wisely. Families and educators share this responsibility. Together, we must guide children in developing habits that are respectful, safe, and thoughtful.

To promote this, we are introducing awareness campaigns, student pledges, and collaboration with cyber safety authorities. Initiatives like forming a Cyber Congress and integrating digital citizenship into our curriculum are steps toward creating a secure digital environment.

However, both parents and educators have concerns regarding the usage of the Internet that needs to be addressed are:

- **Content-related concerns-** Inappropriate content, which is detrimental to the interest of children before a certain age, can be blocked by software like Net Nanny's web filter
- **Conduct-related concerns-** Apart from fun and playfulness, certain online games have become notorious for being extremely addictive often leading to many health issues and behavioral problems among users. Through constant monitoring and counseling, such practices can be controlled.
- **Contact-related concerns-** At times youngsters tend to share personal details online, leading to interference in their lives by external agencies or individuals, misleading them completely. So early education about cyber safety can prevent such issues.
- **Contract-related concerns-** Children have access to numerous websites and applications, and they create accounts, but they are unaware of the contractual obligations they occasionally enter into.

All stakeholders of education need to come together to educate the children about safe surfing, to prevent them from cyber bullying and online frauds. The school teachers are ensuring to embed cyber ethics and etiquettes in the curriculum itself.

The parent fraternity must ensure occasional 'digital detox' for their families. The day to day 'digital diet' of students should be positive and progressive. It's time for the world to prioritise 'cyber safety' as much as the physical safety .

The event concluded with a short quiz and a vote of thanks for the successful completion of ATL Community Day.

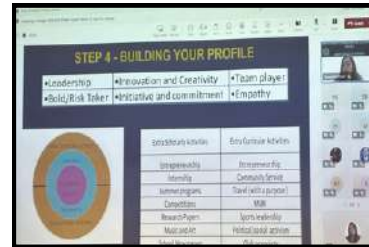
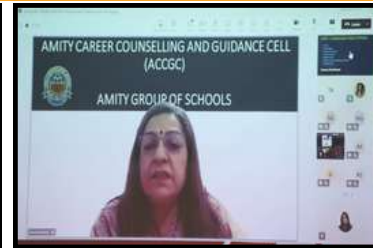


Study Abroad and College Readiness Session
