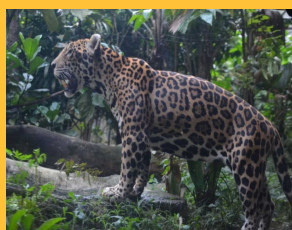

Every year, September 5 is celebrated as teachers' day as a mark of respect to one of India's greatest teacher. Here's remembering Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan.

Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan believed that "teachers should be the best minds in the country". Since 1962, his birthday is being celebrated in India as Teachers' Day on 5 September. He was an Indian philosopher and statesman who was the first Vice President of India (1952–1962) and the second President of India from 1962 to 1967.

His philosophy was grounded in Advaita Vedanta, reinterpreting this tradition for a contemporary understanding. He defended Hinduism against "uninformed Western criticism", contributing to the formation of contemporary Hindu identity. He has been influential in shaping the understanding of Hinduism, in both India and the west, and earned a reputation as a bridge-builder between India and the West. Radhakrishnan has been held up in academic circles as a representative of Hinduism to the West. His lengthy writing career and his many published works have been influential in shaping the West's understanding of Hinduism, India, and the East.

Radhakrishnan was awarded several high awards during his life, including a knighthood in 1931, the Bharat Ratna, the highest civilian award in India, in 1954, and honorary membership of the British Royal Order of Merit in 1963. He was also one of the founders of Helpage India, a non-profit organisation for elderly underprivileged in India.

Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan has been a guiding force for the country and will always continue to be a light which will never be extinguished from our hearts.

Q. How do you empower teachers to be leaders?

These days a lot of people tend to ignore their health in front of other things. We want our students to excel and achieve in various fields, sports being an important one.

Q. What kind of teachers did you like when you were a student?

When I was a student, I absolutely looked forward to classes of those teachers who made learning fun. Activities and discussions, basically hands on assignments used to be my favorite. I also really liked those teachers who encouraged concept-based learning, and always encouraged the students to achieve more and gave constructive feedback.

Q. What do you like about the teaching profession?

It gives me great sense of satisfaction, and it is extremely rewarding for us as teachers when our children achieve the pinnacle of success. We touch human lives and deal with a lot of emotions. It is an overwhelming feeling.
