India is just full of poverty and misery anyway," said Viraj, an eleven-year-old boy who lived with his mother in a small town of Ramgarh. "You mustn't say that son. Viraj rolled his eyes at his mother's comment and dashed out of the house.

Later that day, his mother called for him and said, "Listen to this story, I am sure it will change your thoughts."

### <u>HAPPY INDEPENDENCE DAY—THE STORY BEHIND OUR TRICOLOUR</u> by Bhavya Shankar, IX C

In our country, the first flag was hoisted on August 7, 1906, in Calcutta. At that time, the flag displayed only three horizontal stripes of red, yellow and green, with Vande Mataram inscribed in the middle. Madame Cama and her band of exiled revolutionaries hoisted the second flag in Paris in the year 1907. Quite similar to the first flag, the modification in the second flag was that the top strip had only seven stars denoting the Saptarishi. This flag was also exhibited at a socialist conference in Berlin. Dr Annie Besant and Lokmanya Tilak raised the third flag during the Home rule movement. Unlike the first two flags, this one had five red and four green horizontal strips arranged alternately, with seven stars in the saptarishi configuration. The flag had a star and a crescent that occupied one corner of the flag while the other was taken by Union Jack. Gandhiji, in 1921 asked Pengali Venkayya to design a flag, with the symbol of the charkha or the spinning wheel. The flag as we know it today is largely accredited to Venkayya. During the session of the All India Congress Committee which met at Vijaywada in 1921, Venkayya presented this flag, which was made of two colours: red and green, representing the two major communities which were the Hindus and Muslims. To this, it was suggested to add the white strip to represent the remaining communities of the nation. After some modifications, the national flag was adopted in 1931. Red was replaced with saffron and the white strip moved to the middle. The centre of the flag had the spinning wheel or charkha. The national flag of independent India was largely like the one in 1931 with the exception of the Ashok chakra replacing the charka or spinning wheel. In the tricolour, The saffron on top symbolises courage, the white symbolises peace and the green stands for auspiciousness of the land. The dharma chakra at the centre stands for movement and growth, with the 24 spokes symbolizing 24 virtues- love, courage, patience, peacefulness, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control, selflessness, self-sacrifice, truthfulness, righteousness, justice, mercy, graciousness, humility, empathy, sympathy, spiritual knowledge, supreme wisdom, supreme morality, altruism and hope. The flag that we see today denotes the valour and pride of our illustrious country that is known for its glorious past and promising future. The most remarkable portrayal of our flag is the value system of our country and that's why we must value our country's rich and historical heritage.

#### **DURGA-BHABHI**

7 October, 1930 Bhagat Singh, Sukhdev and Rajguru are sentenced to death. The following days -: "Yes sir, I want to sell all my jewellery. How much can I get for them?" "About Rs.



3,00,000" "Bapu, please fight the case of Bhagat, Sukhdev and Rajguru in court, I'll pay your fees. Please ensure their safety." Durgawati Devi popularly known as 'Durga Bhabhi' was an Indian revolutionary and a freedom fighter. She was one of the few women revolutionaries who actively participated in armed revolution against the ruling British Raj. She was married at an early age of 11 to Bhagwati Charan Vohra, another revolutionary. Other members of HSRA (Hindustan Socialist Republic Association) referred to her as Bhabhi and so she became popular as "Durga Bhabhi". Right after killing Saunders, Sukhdev contacted Durga Bhabhi for help, which

she agreed to do. They decided to catch the train departing from Lahore for Bathinda en route to Howrah (Calcutta) early the next morning. This was a difficult task, for there were over 500 policemen in the train. She posed as the wife of Bhagat Singh (a great taboo in that time as well as today) and put her son Sachin in his lap while Rajguru posed as their servant. After Rajguru, Sukhdev and Bhagat Singh were sentenced to death, she did everything she could. She sold her ornaments to bail them out, she pleaded with Mahatma Gandhi, she even shot a British sergeant and his wife as revenge- all in vain. Unlike other freedom fighters, Durga Bhabhi led an ordinary life afterwards and died at the age of 92 in Ghaziabad. Her life was honoured by naming a chowk after her 'Durga Bhabhi Chowk'.

#### **PALLU**

"She's nothing to us! We have no relation with her!" "Yeah! We don't know her!" The Next Day — "Didi, did you read the Vir Bhagat today." asked a woman sitting in her veranda. "No. Why?" replied another. "The Guptas have disowned Rajkumari. They claimed in the newspaper that they have no relation with her." "What?! Why? Show it to me." Rajkumari Gupta, a name unfamiliar. She was born in Banda Zilla of Kanpur in 1902 to a father who was a grocer. She got married to Madan Mohan Gupta when she was just a child (13 years old). Madan was a revolutionary and an active participant in the activities of Congress. Both of them joined Gandhi's march for independence. However, she got influenced

by the revolutionaries who believed in armed struggle against Britishers, particularly after the Non-Cooperation Movement came to a hasty end. Being closely associated with Chandrashekhar Azad, she began supporting him by secretly carrying notes, letters, encoded messages and other important materials to other revolutionaries. Her husband and in-laws were unaware of her activities. Initially, she got closely connected with Azad's group in Allahabad, which was later led by Bhagat Singh. Not many are aware of her role in delivering firearms to revolutionaries during the famous Kakori train robbery. This was difficult for many reasons. One, she was a woman and it was



difficult to run in a saree. Two, she had a 3-year-old to handle. Last but not the least, she could get arrested and the consequences would be severe. Despite that, she set out to participate in the act, her 3-year-old in hand, the firearms under her pallu. And she got arrested. The news spread like wildfire in her village, and it wasn't late until her in-laws got the hold of it, after which they took matter in their own hands; disowned Kumari and threw her out of her marital home. She led a secluded life after that, without the guilt of playing a crucial part in the freedom of India.

#### **BURQA**

Amma was confused. She had followed strict burqa all her life and there was no way she was lifting the tradition now. Only a few seconds were left for the speech. She wasn't prepared for this. Without thinking twice, she stepped up the stage, and the crowd was utterly shocked. They were not expecting this. This was the first time a Muslim woman had addressed a gathering behind a burqa. Amma gave a most heart-warming and influential speech and left a lasting impression on the Muslims of British India. Abadi Bano Begum, better

known as Bi Amma, was born in 1850, Uttar Pradesh. She married Abdul Ali Khan, who after the birth of their daughter and five sons, succumbed to cholera, leaving her to become the pity of the world. Despite the lack of resources, she ensured her children went to English medium schools in Bareilly by pawning her jewellery. As a result, her sons, Mohammed Ali Jouhar and Mohammed Shaukat Ali went on to become chief figures in the Khilafat movement and the Indian Independence Movement. "Boli Amma Mohammad Ali se (The mother of Mohammad Ali says) Jaan beta Khilafat pe de do (Son, sacrifice your life for the Khilafat Movement)" These lines said by Bi Amma were penned by Mohammed Ali, showing his mother's devotion towards the Khilafat movement.



## **CAPTAIN LAXMI SEHGAL**

As far as we can track history, very few people in India were brave enough to raise the topic of caste in a pre-partitioned India. Even today, it is a taboo on the subject. Many are afraid to question their position on the caste system. The caste system is deeply rooted in India. Even though Gandhi had taken up the cause of the Harijans, it was B.R. Ambedkar who began an active fight against the very system. Captain Laxmi Sehgal outraged a lot of people, in-

cluding her grandmother, when she began to question the age-old caste system in the country and in complete insolence of society as it stood, she walked up to a tribal girl, joined hands with her and began to play. Since her childhood, it was clear that she was going to add her own page in the long, fascinating history of India and its struggle for freedom. When she grew up, she studied and excelled in medicine and became a doctor. She nurtured and tended to the wounds of people in the Azad Hind Fauj. Years later, after she had moved to Singapore to work for a while, she met the legendary Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose. She was fascinated by the freedom movement from an early age and when she heard that Netaji was looking to employee women soldiers to his army as well, she got in touch. Under his support, she began and led a women's regiment: Rani of Jhansi regiment. She was arrested by the British on March 4, 1946, but was released a few months after. Later, she opened her own clinic in Kanpur where she would treat poor people, especially poor women, for free.









During the three day event, they were given opportunity to have individual interaction with senior scientists of NASA who enhanced their knowledge of space science .

Children's dream of stargazing with unparalleled views of the night sky got fulfilled with presence of our respected principal ma'am and able guidance of Singhal sir and teachers.

The programme developed student's ability to ask questions, collect information, organize & test ideas, problem solving & applying what one learns. Evermore ASDC offered powerful platform for building confidence, developing communication skills and making sense of world around us- a world that's increasingly shaped by Science & Technology. 165+ students participated in the prestigious competition.

The students were thrilled to see the lush green campus, infrastructure, labs, hostel and other facilities. The students not only got an exposure to space competition but also an opportunity to learn new innovative ideas.




Online Award Ceremony of Vasudha 2021-22
