




Helping Hands, Healthy Minds

Have you ever noticed, when you help your friends, relatives, grandparents, and other fellows you feel happiness inside your heart? When you help your friend with homework, listen to someone who is sad, help your neighbour in carrying groceries, etc you are even helping your brain .


Scientist Sae Hwang Han, and his team studied more than 30,000 adults in the United States over almost 20 years. They wanted to learn what keeps the brain reduced to about 15-20% more slowly for those people who helped others. Although other factors like education, health, and emotions also effect the brain, but people who stopped helping often showed weaker memory, and thinking skills. The study focused on adults but experts believe that helping others is useful at any age. If children learn to help early, they build kindness, confidence, and social skills that can last a lifetime.

The Greatest Gift: A Journey of Literacy

Synopsis: This heartwarming book by Sudha Murty begins with the story of a young girl living in a small village in North Karnataka. The plot truly thickens when the girl's grandmother, Krishtakka, realizes she is helpless because she cannot read her favorite magazine, Kashi Yatre. The story is truly intriguing as it follows the 62-year-old grandmother as she decides to become a student and learn the alphabet from her own granddaughter. There are several other short stories in this collection that share different viewpoints on honesty, courage, and simple village life. The bond between the two main characters gives the book a far deeper dimension than an ordinary children's book. 
